# LETTER FROM MOST REVEREND BISHOP HAINES

Dear NACC Community,

As I live into my second year as the Episcopal Liaison for the National Association of Catholic Chaplains, I am full of hope and appreciation. My inaugural year was a fruitful experience as I learned more about the organization and its offerings to its members and the whole Church. I also had the opportunity to meet many of you, its dedicated members, in person at the 2023 NACC Retreat at the University of St. Mary of the Lake. Reflecting on the strengths and future of the NACC, I see many parallels to the hopes and desires uncovered by the Synod for a Synodal Church, most notably, the aspiration for co-responsibility.

The NACC and its members have an extensive history of co-responsibility as chaplains and pastoral care ministers continuing the healing ministry of Jesus in the name of our Church. Through our partnership with the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, the NACC board-certified chaplains reflect a tangible example of an empowered 'relationship of collaboration.' Until June 30, 2023, the NACC worked with the former USCCB's Subcommittee on Certification for Ecclesial Ministry and Service (SCEMS). The Subcommittee dissolved after 12 synergetic years of working together. I want to express my gratitude to Mark DelMonico, the lead staff of SCEMS and liaison for the NACC, for his dedication and care to the work and members of the NACC. The NACC will now work with Paul Jarzembowski and Dominic Lombardi from the Secretariat of Laity, Marriage, Family Life, and Youth, whom Erica Cohen Moore and I had the pleasure of meeting in November during the USCCB's Plenary Assembly. It was a stirring encounter, and I look forward to our future work together.

As we discern how to continue living out our synodal call for co-responsibility, I am hopeful for the NACC's future. The board of directors has a bold vision of becoming a centralized resource and home for Catholic pastoral ministry. The NACC can faithfully and humbly meet a central need in today's Church–empowering pastoral care ministers, especially the laity, through formation, community, and personal development. As a bishop, a lifelong pastor, and an advocate for lay, clergy, and religious ministry formation, I am thrilled to see Catholic Partners in Pastoral Care come to life, and the NACC work to expand professional chaplaincy.

I will continue to hold the NACC in my prayers.

# LETTER FROM NACC'S EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

As I reflect on 2023, I am delighted with what the NACC community, leadership, and staff have accomplished. We spent the year re-evaluating, re-envisioning, and restructuring to continue supporting our members while growing their visibility as primary beacons of hope and light in the church.



"Nor do they light a lamp and then put it under a bushel basket; it is set on a lampstand where it gives light to all in the house. Just so, your light must shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your heavenly Father." (Matthew 5:15-16)

The chaplains and members of NACC have accompanied the sick, the imprisoned, the marginalized, and the invisible for 58 years. By nature, they do it quietly and humbly, without fanfare and comfortably hidden under the proverbial bushel basket. In 2023 the NACC created a lampstand, a solid infrastructure, allowing us to share the charitable light of their good deeds with the church, and the world.

It was a year of growth and change, charged with hope and a reimagining of chaplaincy in a synodal church.

- We grew our Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging initiatives by forming a DEIB committee. We hosted an anti-racism training for all NACC leadership at the beginning of the year.
- We contracted with a development company, Changing Our World (CoW), to help envision a comprehensive plan to establish the long-term financial stability for the NACC. Based on recommendations made by CoW, prayer, and guidance from the Holy Spirit, Alex Rich joined the NACC team as our first Director of Development to provide oil for the lamp so it can keep burning longer and brighter.
- The NACC completed a comprehensive technology and systems audit with ExcalTech resulting in significant improvements, including upgraded computer software and the implementation of enhanced security protocols.
- Our Marketing and Communications team, Westwords Consulting, conducted a communication survey to gauge how our members prefer to receive information. The survey results confirmed we needed an immediate website update and a fresh concept for Vision magazine. It also affirmed our concise NACC newsletter format, and that our members like that we communicate via multiple platforms.
- Our outreach continues to expand, growing chaplaincy awareness across different ministry settings and
  platforms. We expanded our memberships for Educational Collaborators and Healthcare Collaborators.
   Focused discussions were held with Public Safety (First Responder) Chaplains, Chaplains to the Incarcerated,
  and Seafarers Chaplains to explore competencies and education processes that can lead members of those
  ministries to become Certified Associate Chaplains.

I am grateful to serve the NACC community and feel blessed to work with an amazing team, a talented and committed board of directors, and a community who continue the healing ministry of Jesus in the name of the Church.

2023 was a year to look internally, to dream, to plan, and to build the lampstand where the light of the chaplain and our members will shine brightly in 2024!

# **WEBINAR SERIES**

Staying true to our mission to educate and support chaplains, NACC provided 11 enriching professional development webinars for our members. We had over 170 members attend these sessions for a total of 1,322 continuing education hours. The webinars ranged in topic as each highlighted an important part of our members daily work and ministry.

NACC also provided several free educational offerings for members throughout the year. These were offered in a live format and members were also provided access to the recorded sessions. Sessions ranged from chaplaincy specific webinars to NACC business related webinars. These provided 1,100 additional continuing education hours to the more than 700 attending members.

# THE NEW CAC

As part of our mission to advocate for the profession of spiritual care, in 2023, NACC worked to expand support further and include more pastoral care ministers in the United States. After much prayer and discernment, NACC adjusted the requirements for the Certified Associate Chaplain (CAC) level of certification.

Recognizing that the rigorous board certification process may not be appropriate, accessible, or needed for all pastoral care ministers, the CAC provides a broader pathway to certification for pastoral care ministers in various ministry areas like prison ministry, long-term care/rehab facilities, shelters, police/fire stations, seaports, and the diaconate. As the need for chaplaincy continues to grow in different sectors of society, the NACC continues to explore ways to provide a variety of specialty certifications to meet this demand and welcome more chaplains into the NACC family.

# WHEN THE WORLD CRUMBLES, HOPE RISES: INSIDE THE RED CROSS DISASTER SPIRITUAL CARE

Picture the aftermath of a disaster - homes reduced to ash, families mourning loved ones, communities reeling in shock. In these moments of deepest despair, a beacon of hope shines through the American Red Cross Disaster Spiritual Care (DSC) program. Dedicated volunteers, chaplains, faith leaders from all walks of faith, walking alongside those affected. They offer more than just a hand; they offer a compassionate presence, a listening ear, and a space for spiritual solace amidst the chaos. This is the essence of the DSC program - providing emotional and spiritual support to individuals and families 24/7, 365 days a year.

The DSC program began following the Aviation Disaster Family Assistance Act of 1996 which paved the way for the National Transportation Safety Board to delegate the responsibility for providing disaster spiritual care, mental health, health care, childcare, and mass care services to the Red Cross.

To meet the specific responsibility of providing disaster spiritual care, the Red Cross sought out the partnership of professional chaplaincy organizations like the NACC. The first DSC team was trained at the NACC conference in San Diego, CA, in March of 1999. The DSC program has grown exponentially from a collaborative partner to a fully integrated function of the Red Cross. The DSC remains 100% volunteer-led and supported with volunteer service associates, supervisors, division advisors, and national leads present in every region, state, and territory of the US.

Their impact spans across every kind of tragedy:

- House fires: Offering immediate comfort to displaced families, helping them navigate grief and loss.
- National disasters: From wildfires to hurricanes, DSC volunteers stand shoulder-to-shoulder with communities, providing solace and hope in the face of devastation.
- Mass shootings: In moments of unthinkable tragedy, DSC volunteers offer sensitive support to families and first responders, helping them process the unimaginable.

In 2023, DSC volunteers made a life-changing difference:

- Guam: After super-typhoons decimated the island, DSC volunteers provided sustained support and trained 20 new volunteers to continue the healing process.
- Maui Wildfires: Partnering with mental health professionals, they offered comfort and guidance to displaced families facing immense loss and long-term recovery.
- Mass shootings: From California to Maine, DSC volunteers provided sensitive support to grieving communities, helping them find strength and solace.
- Individual interventions: Over 2,500 times, DSC volunteers offered spiritual support to individuals facing the loss of loved ones, homes, or even beloved pets.

The DSC program thrives on the dedication of volunteers, chaplains, and the invaluable partnerships with professional chaplaincy organizations like ours. By walking alongside individuals and communities at their most vulnerable, helping them find strength, meaning, and a path forward, we can ensure that even in the darkest hours, hope never fades.




